## **PASTOR'S PARAGRAPHS**

### **THE WAY**

In John 14:6, Jesus describes himself as “the way, the truth and the life. No one can come to the Father except by (through) me.” In this vivid description, followers of Jesus are invited and encouraged to understand their lives in accordance with both the manner in which Jesus guides and leads us unto the eternal presence of the Father and also by which Jesus himself is the model and example of the manner in which we are called to live our lives.

As the “way,” Jesus is both the path we are to follow as well as the manner by which we are to conduct ourselves on the way: “follow this way” and “do it this way.” In our world, we are confronted by numerous paths for which we may choose. The path that leads to success. The path that leads to happiness. The path that leads to financial security. Each of these paths promises and offers some type of reward or payment for our choice to follow that particular path and for our efforts to stay on that path. The truth of the matter, as Jesus described, is that the only path that is able to get us to our ultimate destination is through and by the way of Jesus. Other paths may well lead to temporary glimpses of wealth, power, satisfaction, happiness and the like. But the span of each of these paths is limited. The way of Jesus, though, is eternal whereby the promise is unending.

Additionally, the “way” of Jesus is more than a path to follow; it is the “way” to live while on the path. Access to the eternal truth and life in the Father is much more than assenting to a way of believing; beliefs are given their proper perspective through actions. The “way” Jesus lived is the “way” we are also called to live. This is the “way” of obedience to the Father’s commands as well as selfless, sacrificial and unconditional love given to others. The true meaning and purpose of our lives is revealed through an understanding of God’s will and promise that leads to life, and this revelation is given full disclosure through the “way” Jesus taught and the “way” he conducted his life. Life is to be found in both where Jesus leads us as well as in imitating how Jesus acts as he leads us.

# ***PENTECOST***



There are three "mega-festivals" commemorated in the Christian calendar. The first two, Christmas and Easter, are well known to both believers and non-believers. But it's possible that even liturgical Christians may not be as familiar with the third, the festival of Pentecost. God the Father's wonderful Christmas gift of His one and only Son, and Christ's Easter triumph over the power of sin, death, and the devil would be of no benefit to us if the Holy Spirit did not give us the gift of saving faith. Through the Word and Sacraments, the Holy Spirit gives us the power to believe and trust in Christ as our Savior. This precious gift of faith in the saving work of our Lord Jesus Christ is the reason Pentecost is the third "mega-festival" of the church and why we celebrate it with such joy and thanksgiving.

The two most common Pentecost symbols represent the Holy Spirit. A descending dove is frequently used to symbolize the coming of the Spirit, since the Gospel of Luke reports that the Holy Spirit came to Jesus at his baptism in the form of a dove. (Luke 3:22). Tongues of fire are also used to symbolize the Holy Spirit, based on the account of Pentecost found in Acts 2:1-4. The liturgical color for the Day of Pentecost is bright red, which reminds us of the fire of the Spirit.

Bright red is also the color of the geraniums we use to decorate the sanctuary on Pentecost (**June 12**). If you would like to donate some geraniums for this purpose (the plants will then be planted around the church), please fill out the form below and return it to Idella Zimmerman or Margie.

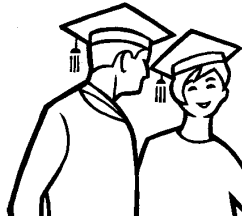

### **Convention**

The USSWO Twenty-Fourth annual convention is coming up on **Saturday, July 23**, at Camp Mt. Luther. The convention theme is "Welcoming the Stranger."

There will be three opportunities for giving—

**(1) A freewill offering** will be received during the worship service Saturday morning. This is used to support the on-going ministries of the Women of the ELCA.

**(2) Mission Ingathering**—this year is designated to support Mt. Luther as they continue to help children/youth and adults grow in faith through camping and retreat experiences.

**(3) In-Kind Gifts** (Personal Ingathering). This year these gifts will go to the Ronald McDonald House in Danville, which is a safe place for families of children in the hospital to stay.

*I am whatever you make me, nothing more, nothing less.*



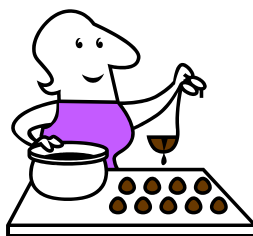
## YOUTH NEWS

## SCHOOL KITS

A school kit may provide the only supplies for children returning to school after the disruption of war. School kits help parents continue their children's education, even while living in a refugee camp, for example. A school kit may also be used in adult literacy classes.

Your group can also help LWR get school kits to the people who need them by donating a brick on the [Good Samaritan Quilt Plaza](#) or by making a contribution to the [Project Comfort Fund](#).

Review the [General Assembly Instructions](#) before collecting items for the school kits.

Include the following items in each school kit:

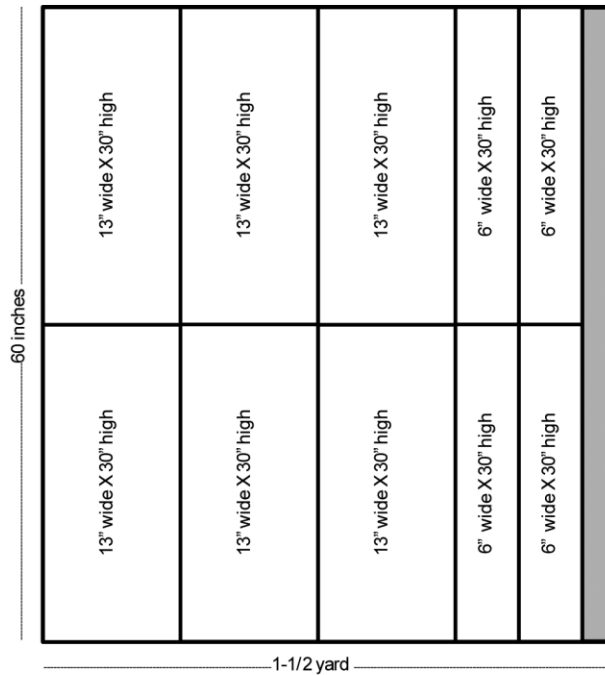
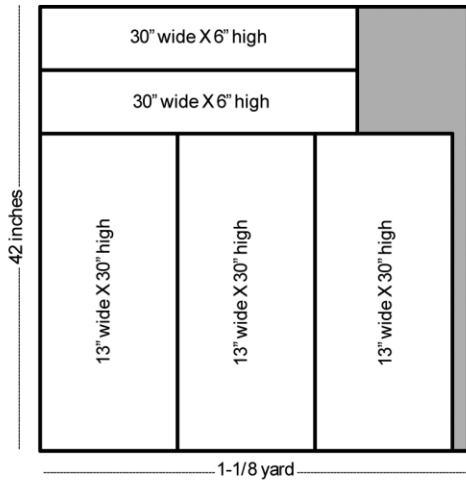
- Notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" x 10 ½" totaling 150-200 sheets (if using 70-sheet notebooks, please include three); no loose-leaf paper
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- One pencil sharpener
- Six new, unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- One eraser approximately 2 ½" long
- 12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors (if necessary, fold in half to fit into the school kit bag)
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons
- One sturdy cloth bag approximately 12" X 14" with cloth handles or drawstring closure (see below for downloadable patterns)

**Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed.** All items should be new and in good condition. Remove any excess packaging and pack items in the bag, fold the handles over, and secure with two large rubber bands or tie with yarn.



# TOTE-STYLE SCHOOL BAG

- Choose your fabric. Sturdy fabrics such as denim, corduroy or twill are excellent choices.
  - 1-1/8 yard of 42"-44" wide fabric yields three 12" X 14" bags
  - 1-1/4 yard of 60" wide fabric yields six 12" X 14" bags
- Use the illustrations below to cut pieces.



- Finish the short sides of the 13" X 30" rectangle to prevent fraying: zigzag the edge then fold over 1/2" towards the wrong side; stitch approximately 3/8" from folded edge.
- Fold rectangle in half, right sides together, to form bag. Sew sides with a 1/2" seam. Zigzag edges to prevent fraying. Turn right side out.
- For the handles, fold each 6" X 30" rectangle in half lengthwise, right sides together. Sew a 1/2" seam for form a tube. Cut into three 10" pieces and turn each tube right side out. Zigzag across short ends to prevent fraying. Attach one handle to each side of bag.

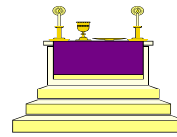

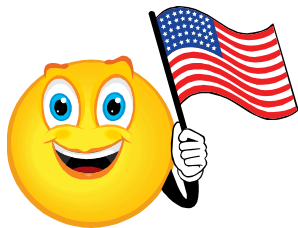
